## Some good news

**Seven countries** now generate almost 100 per cent of their energy from renewable sources (The Independent). Albania, Bhutan, Nepal, Paraguay, Iceland, Ethiopia and the Democratic Republic of the Congo generated more than 99.7 per cent of the electricity they used from geothermal, hydro, solar or wind power. Further data showed that another 40 countries generated at least half of the electricity consumed from renewable sources in 2021 and 2022.

Eurostar is aiming to power its trains with **100 per cent renewable energy** by 2030 (euronews.com). Since 2017, its trains have been running solely on wind power in the Netherlands, and since 2023, 40 per cent of its energy has been powered by wind power in the UK.

This year it was reported that pine martens have **returned from the brink of extinction** in the south of England (The Independent). Experts stated that these
creatures have made their home across the New Forest.

This year, the Tales from the Riverbank project is holding a <u>Literature</u>



**Plot that Plastic** 

Plastic pollution is a threat to UK environments, even when its origin has been for good. Tree guards are an excellent example of this - they protect young trees from animals like deer and rabbits as well as other sources of damage, and they signal establishing trees. Trees are an integral part of ecosystems, providing habitats for a host of creatures and organisms, and removing carbon dioxide from the atmosphere. However, unfortunately, these tree guards can be forgotten about and left behind, becoming plastic pollution.

Therefore, Forest Plastics Working Group has set up a project to build a map showing locations of tree guards. This will help raise awareness of the issue, educate the public, and gather and share data that can facilitate the removal of guards at the appropriate time and assist in the development of recycling hubs.

## Tales from the Riverbank

Hampshire's chalk streams are a unique and important part of the local environment, and one that has inspired authors and artists for many years. Tales from the Riverbank is a project that celebrates this creativity, and this year a Literature Festival is being held across Hampshire towns and villages in June to encourage storytelling about this tranquil and intrinsic part of the county's wild spaces.

Lots of exciting events are being held, including workshops, to get attendees into their flow, and speaker talks, such as <u>an evening with Matt Gaw</u>, acclaimed author of *The Pull of the River: A Journey Into The Wild and Watery Heart of Britain.* Events are free however booking a spot is required - click <u>here</u> to view all the events and book via Eventbrite to secure your place.
